Hummingbird Study Info

Alert: Race in East Rock Park May 4th

Ranger Dan Barvir has asked that we alert birders that there will be a trail race in East Rock Park on Sunday, May 4th from 8 am to noon. Other nearby areas that are good for birding this time of year are Edgerton Park, West Rock Ridge State Park, Edgewood Park and Branford Supply Ponds.

They're Baaack

The Bald Eagles on State Street in Hamden above the railroad tracks and across from the W.B.Mason warehouse are at it again. They are now sitting on egg(s?). The first egg was laid about March 9th. How do I know this I hear you ask? Simple observation: When the male and female stop just sitting on branches and one or the other of them is actually "setting" on the nest. Hatching is typically about 35 days after the egg is laid which puts it in mid-April. You will know when the eggs hatch too. The bird's behavior will change again.

In other news: I believe last year's fledge came back for a visit (hard to tell for sure – not banded) It chatted briefly with mom before dad chased her off.

Last year, we had about 2,500 different people drop by. I asked everyone I could if they had ever seen a wild eagle before. About 2/3 of them said no.

This whole thing is really "The Miracle on State Street".

Cancellation notices will also be posted online on ctbird. Meetings are at Whitney Center, Cultural Arts Center, 200 Leeder Hill Drive, Hamden. The facility is wheelchair accessible.

Directions to Whitney Center (200 Leeder Hill Drive, Hamden)

From I-95 North or South: Exit onto I-91 North in New Haven. Take Exit 6 (Willow St.). Continue with directions from I-91 (next).

From I-91 North or South: Take Exit 6 (Willow St.) in New Haven. At end of ramp, turn right onto Willow and proceed to the end (Whitney Ave.). Turn right onto Whitney. Drive 1.6 miles then turn left onto Putnam Ave. (Note: Playwright Restaurant is on the left). Then follow starred directions (**) below.

From Wilbur Cross (Rte. 15) North or South: Take Exit 61 (Whitney Ave). If southbound, turn right at end of ramp onto Whitney Ave. If northbound, turn left at end of ramp. Drive 2.4 mi., then turn right onto Putnam Ave. (Note: Playwright Restaurant is on the corner). Continue as follows:

**On Putnam, go approximately 0.7 mi, and at the third traffic light turn right onto Leeder Hill Dr. (Note: AT&T bldg at intersection). Go 0.6 mi. on Leeder Hill to Whitney Center on the left. Turn left at the first entrance, which has a big sign "South Entrance." After turning in, take an immediate left onto a raised parking area.

The meeting is in Whitney Center's South Building. Enter the main door, which is under the portico that is in view from the parking lot. Turn right down the hallway. The Cultural Arts Center is a short distance on the left.

Thursday, April 10, 2014 — Steve Broker "Ravens at Their Nest"

The Common Raven extended its breeding range into CT in the late 1980s, and it now can be found throughout the state. A breeding pair has been observed closely at West Rock Ridge in Woodbridge since discovery of the nest in 2003. Tonight Steve will discuss raven life history strategies including pair bonding, mating, nest-building, egg-laying, hatching, foraging for and caching of food, feeding and fledging of young, play behavior, defense of territory, and how they get along with their neighboring nesting peregrine falcons. Steve is a member and past president of NHBC and is in his 10th year as secretary of COA. An avid devotee of bird counts, he has participated in 30 Christmas Bird Counts with NHBC, and numerous others in CT and other states. He has served as CT Statewide CBC compiler for 26 years. A devoted participant in Summer Bird Counts too, he was active in the CT Breeding Bird Atlas in the 1980s, and as a lifelong summer resident on Cape Cod, he contributed many hours

of field work for the recently completed Massachusetts Breeding Bird Atlas. His birding focus in CT is breeding Common Ravens and Peregrine Falcons at West Rock Ridge State Park. In Massachusetts, his focus is the marsh birds of the Outer Cape. A *BONUS!* After tonight's informational lecture, you can further expand your experience of ravens on a field trip that Steve will lead just 3 days later. Don't miss this splendid opportunity. NHBC Winter Feeder Report 2013-2014 – End of Week 15

We have finished the first 15 weeks of the survey and so far this year no Pine Siskins, Common Redpolls and Red-breasted Nut Hatches have been reported

We had 34 of the 34 Common Species show up for a score of 100%.

There were no new species added to the uncommon list and we had 9 of 32 during the last five week period for 28%. Species seen were Black Vulture (Deborah Johnson), Brown Creeper (Maris Fiondella, Bev Propen, and Charlotte K. White), Cedar Waxwing (Deborah Johnson), Eastern Towhee (Bev Propen), Hermit Thrush (Tim Rodgers), Red-shouldered Hawk (Bev Propen), Rusty Blackbird (Deborah Johnson, Nancy Rosenbaum, and Edward Sprowson), Winter Wren (Deborah Johnson) and Yellow-rumped Warbler (Tim Rodgers).

No waterfowl were seen during the last five weeks.

Ten of twenty animals were seen during these five weeks for a 50% sighting. They were Gray Squirrel, Chipmunk, Feral Cat, Mole, Opossum, Rabbit, Raccoon, Red Fox, Skunk, and Whitetailed Deer.

I have compared five species for weeks one to fifteen. American Goldfinch is about the same as last year, Black-capped Chickadee is down about 20 birds, Common Grackle are way down, Darkeyed Juncos are about the same, and White-throated Sparrows are about the same as last year but way down from 2011-2012.

East Rock Birding and Trail Maintenance, New Haven Saturday, April 12, 2014, 8:00 am

The Charles E. Wheeler Marsh at the mouth of the Housatonic River provides valuable foraging habitat for Great and Snowy Egrets nesting on nearby Charles Island. Today we will focus on long-legged waders and their habitat needs. This walk is geared to beginners but birders of all levels are invited. Families are welcome. Meet at the Lighthouse Point Park hawk watch parking lot and bird the harbor shore for gulls, loons, ducks, and shorebirds. We will then go to the Richard English Bird Sanctuary on Deer Lake in Killingworth. We finish our birding tour with a visit to Hammonasset State Park. West Rock Ridge State Park: New Haven, Hamden, & Woodbridge - "Aves Agonistes: The Intertwined Lives of Peregrines and Ravens"

Sunday, April 13, 2014, 8:00 am

We focus on just two breeding species for this trip to West Rock Ridge: Peregrine Falcon and Common Raven. A pair of Peregrine Falcons selected West Rock as their home base in 1999, thereby becoming one of the first breeding pairs in CT in the post-DDT era. Since then, 5 different females and 5 different

males (tiercels) have occupied the ridge in various combinations. We observe their cliff site from an appropriate distance with the expectation of seeing flying, perching, preening, feeding, and agonistic interactions with the nearby nesting ravens, and incubation of eggs. Common Ravens were confirmed as breeders at West Rock in 2002, and the presumed same pair has nested here annually since then, producing 4 to 5 young in most years. We observe them from unusually close range as they soar, perch, bring in cached food, fight with the peregrines, and attend young in the cliff nest. Bring binoculars, cameras, and two extra layers of clothing (really!). The wind and cold at cliff top often bear no relation to conditions 450 feet below in the West River valley. Ansonia Nature Center, Ansonia Saturday, April 19, 2014, 8:00 am

Enjoy a walk at this fine birding location. The nature center has a small pond, grassy fields, thickets, wetlands, and woods. The woods have had Northern Goshawk and Great Horned Owls nesting there and there are often surprises. Meet at the nature center parking lot on Deerfield Lane (off Benz Road.) in Ansonia. East Rock Park Garlic Mustard Pull Sat., May 3, 2014 (following the Bird Walk with Ranger Dan)

Dan's bird walk will end around 11:30, and after a lunch break, we will get to work pulling garlic mustard in a heavily infested area of the park. This invasive plant is a pernicious, prolific pest that can overrun forested areas, squeeze out native spring flowers, kill butterfly caterpillars, and alter the habitat of our native birds. The rampant growth can be daunting, but with many hands and an organized approach, we can help reclaim the park. Long pants and sleeves are recommended. Bring work gloves if you have them. On Friday, February 7 at Hammonasset State Park in Madison, the New Haven Bird Club's First Wednesday walk was led by Greg Hanisek, and a beautiful day it was. Twenty-four birders

basked in the sunshine while viewing 46 species of birds. The waters were quiet with most of the action in the skies. Fantastic looks at a Roughlegged Hawk soaring over our heads, 3 Bald Eagles, Cooper's Hawk, Sharpshin Hawk, Red-shouldered Hawk, Northern Harrier, and Merlin. On the



ground we had a Lapland Longspur and Fox Sparrow. Thanks to Greg and all participants for a delightful morning of birding.

Rhode Island Coast Field Trip Report

On Saturday, February 22nd, 2014, fifteen birders participated in the all-day field trip to the Rhode Island coast. We were fortunate to have good weather for the trip, as this has been a cold and snowy winter. It was warm and dry, and a bit breezy. We saw a number of good birds, including two Snowy Owls, but it was the waterfowl that stole the show.

We started the trip at the Branford commuter lot, where four Black Vultures circled overhead. We stopped along Route 138 in Kingstown, RI to look for a pair of Sandhill Cranes that have been wintering there. We didn't see the cranes, but there was an early Killdeer and a Cooper's Hawk. We made one more stop on our way to Beavertail State Park, at Marsh Meadow Preserve in Jamestown. In addition to the common species, we saw seventeen Northern Pintail in the marsh, an impressive number. At Beavertail, we saw Black Scoter, Common Eider, Harlequin Duck, Common Goldeneye, Common Loon, Red-breasted Merganser, Horned Grebe, and Great Cormorant. We also saw a Rednecked Grebe, getting good, extended looks at this uncommon species. We saw lots more waterfowl at our next stop at Easton Ponds in Newport. There, we saw Canada Geese, Mallard, American Black Duck, American Wigeon, Canvasback, Ringnecked Duck, a lone Long-tailed Duck, Common and Hooded Merganser, Ruddy Duck, and Green-winged Teal. Most of the

waterfowl were concentrated in the few areas of open water, while some were roosting on the ice at the water's edge. We were running late by the time we got to Sachuest National Wildlife Refuge, and it was crowded with people taking advantage of the warm weather, so we moved on to nearby Third Beach. There, we got close looks at a slumbering Snowy Owl (see photo) as well as more waterfowl, including Surf Scoter, Greater Scaup, and Bufflehead. From there, it was on to Marina Park in North Kingstown where a Redhead

had been reported. It took a while to find the Redhead, but before we did we found a bonus bird, a drake Northern Shoveler. We stopped on the way to our next destination, Moonstone Beach, long enough to find two pairs of Gadwall in a small cove. At Moonstone Beach, we were treated to a long-distance look at another Snowy Owl, roosting on the frozen pond (Trustum Pond). We also saw White-winged Scoter and a first year male Common Eider there. We then headed for Ninigret National

Wildlife Refuge where we added Eurasian Wigeon to our lengthening list of waterfowl seen on the trip. The last addition to the list was Wood Duck, when a pair flew out of Weekapaug Marsh soon after our arrival. When the day was done, we had

recorded 31 species of waterfowl, comprising nearly half of our species total for the day. We tallied 65 species, in all. Tired, but satisfied, we left our neighboring state to return home. We'll be heading back to Rhode Island next winter, for sure.

On March 29, 35 participants joined leader Frank Mantlik at Stratford, Lordship Seawall and Long Beach Park. Highlights included: EURASIAN WIGEON, Lesser Scaup, NORTHERN GANNETS, an early DOUBLE-CRESTED CORMORANT, GREAT EGRET, ROUGH-LEGGED HAWK, American Kestrel, American

Oystercatcher, Lesser Yellowlegs, ICELAND GULL, LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULL, and two SNOWY OWLS. There was also an earlier-reported EARED GREBE seen by some in the group.

48 species were seen: Brant, Canada Goose, Mute Swan, Gadwall, Eurasian Wigeon, American Wigeon, American Black Duck, Mallard, Green-winged Teal, Greater Scaup, Lesser Scaup, Long-tailed Duck, Bufflehead, Common Goldeneye, Red-breasted Merganser, Red-throated Loon, Common Loon, Horned Grebe, Northern Gannet, Double-crested Cormorant, Great Egret, Red-tailed Hawk, Rough-legged Hawk, American Oystercatcher, Killdeer, Lesser Yellowlegs, Sanderling, Dunlin, Bonaparte's Gull, Ring-billed Gull, Herring Gull, Iceland Gull, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Rock Pigeon (Feral Pigeon), Mourning Dove, Snowy Owl, American Kestrel, Fish Crow, Carolina Wren, American Robin, Northern Mockingbird, European Starling, American Tree Sparrow, Song Sparrow, Northern Cardinal, Red-winged Blackbird, Common Grackle, House Sparrow
