#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



This column is about email: the Good, the Bad, and the Ugly.

First, the Good. Club members who are on the MailChimp email distribution list received an invitation in early August to complete a member survey. The Board is working to evaluate the activities and functions of the Club with an eye towards both our past and our future, and obviously

wanted to involve our members. We received 128 individual responses to the survey. Although there is no standard threshold for a good survey response rate, we consider that an excellent response given our membership base of about 500 households. Sincere thanks to those who took the time to give us your feedback and ideas.

The survey results indicated we are doing a good job in our current programs including our many bird walks, our monthly member meetings and banquet, bird counts including the Mega Bowl and Big Sit!, educational outreach, and conservation. You indicated that our Club priorities and focus for the coming years should include outdoor programs, conservation efforts, and educational outreach. Only a few members were interested in information about joining the Board, but one-third of the respondents would be willing to work with us in the same top three priority areas of conservation, educational outreach, and outdoor programs.

The Board reviewed your feedback as part of our Leadership and Planning Retreat, held on Sunday, September 29, 2024. Meg Bollin and Celeste Echlin did an amazing job over many months, working with our professional facilitator Jim Leahy and organizing everything down to the smallest details. Board and Club members along with leaders from a few other volunteer organizations got together for five hours at Bent of the River Audubon Center for a structured goal-setting and planning session. After brainstorming as a group, smaller working groups were established for Youth/School Outreach, Conservation, and Coalition Building/Community Outreach. This work will be ongoing. Further updates on these activities will be shared with our members as the work progresses.

Next, the Bad and Ugly: It is becoming more common for any and all of us to receive not only spam email but also "phishing" email. Phishing emails appear to come from someone we know or from an organization we belong to, but in reality are part of a scam. The New Haven Bird Club is not alone in having to deal with this unfortunate fact of online life.

directly to confirm we've emailed you. Our contact information is in your Club yearbook.

- 1. Verify the sender is who you think it is. Depending on your specific system, you may be able to double-click the sender's name at the top of the email to view the real email address. Alternately, if you start to "reply" to the email, the real email address will show up in the "To" section. If you cannot verify the sender, do not click any links or actually reply. If the email refers to a known website, do not click on it, but type that website address into a new browser window instead and check for information there.
- 2. **Think critically** about the way the email is worded and what the request is. Anything urgently requesting action regarding financial transactions or asking for sensitive information should be a red flag to investigate carefully.
- 3. **Report** any communication (email or text) you suspect is a phishing attempt. The information you give to the following organizations helps fight scammers:

If you got a phishing **email**, forward it to the Anti-Phishing Working Group at: reportphishing@apwg.org.

If you got a phishing **text message**, forward it to SPAM (7726).

In either case, report the phishing attempt to the FTC at **ReportFraud.ftc.gov**.

### **Indoor Programs**

Please check the NHBC website and newsletter for updated information before planning to attend any event.

Indoor programs start in September and are held on the second Thursday of the month except for June, July, and August. Monthly program meetings are held in the Whitney Center's Cultural Arts Center, 200 Leeder Hill Drive, Hamden CT. The facility is wheelchair accessible. Enter via the main door of the portico at the front of the building. Turn right down the hallway. The Cultural Arts Center is a short distance on the left. **The social half-hour begins at 7 p.m.; the meeting and program begin at 7:30 p.m. and end about 9 p.m.** 

Some indoor programs are held only as virtual, online presentations and noted as such in the descriptions. The online presentation starts at 7 p.m.

Cancellation Policy: Inclement weather or other emergency may cancel in-person meetings. Cancellation notices will be sent via the Club email and posted on the CTBirds listserv when possible.

Bird Book Sales now will be held at EACH indoor meeting in the "Book Nook" area using the honor system and with no set prices. Sort through your bird- and nature-related books (kids' books too). **PARKING:** Enter the Whitney Center's South Entrance, marked with a sign. Either make an immediate left into the raised parking lot (park *only* in the upper level and *only* in unnumbered spaces) or follow the main driveway past the front entrance of the building. At the stop sign, turn right into the visitor and employee parking area and walk back from there to the front entrance.

#### Thursday, October 10 – Dr. Chris Loscalzo The Sparrows of Connecticut

Join Chris as he takes us through the various sparrow species found in Connecticut at the height of sparrow migration. Learn facts and useful ID points for these entertaining but underappreciated birds. Chris will discuss the sparrow species from the most to the least common. Chris is past-President of the New Haven Bird Club and the Connecticut Ornithological Association, the longtime compiler of the New Haven Christmas Count, and the creator and compiler of the Mega Bowl of New Haven County and Connecticut.

#### Thursday, November 14 - Member's Night

#### Thursday, December 12 – Joseph Zbyrowski Barn Owls and Barn Owl Restoration

Join us for a presentation by local raptor specialist, Joseph Zbyrowski, during which he will emphasize barn owl characteristics, physical features, and behavior. He will also discuss restoration methods to encourage owls to nest and reproduce. Joseph has been working with hawks and owls for more than 30 years. He is a retired teacher of environmental science; master bird-bander; and former raptor rehabilitator and volunteer with the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Park Service, and the Audubon Society of Rhode Island. He conducts an annual hawk migration count in Rhode Island and is currently involved with Peregrine Falcon and Barn Owl restoration projects.

#### **September 2024 Indoor Meeting**

The NHBC launched its 2024-2025 indoor program on September 12th, with 75 participants—41 attending in person and 34 joining online.

Our featured speaker, Patrick J. Lynch, gave an engaging

presentation titled "A River Runs Through Us: The Environmental History of the Connecticut River Region." His talk explored the intricate cultural and ecological interactions that have shaped the Connecticut River region, offering insights into the landscape that defines New England today. This



presentation was based on his newly published book, *A Field Guide to the Connecticut River: From New Hampshire to Long Island Sound*, released by Yale University Press in April 2024. In addition, the Audubon Shop was present, offering attendees the opportunity to purchase signed copies of Patrick's book.

The meeting also marked the debut of NHBC's new "Book Nook" initiative, where attendees could choose a book and pay what they wished. The initiative was warmly received, and we plan to continue it at future indoor events. Joyce's delicious homemade baked goods added a special touch to the evening, delighting everyone.

Thank you to all who joined us, whether in person or online. We look forward to seeing you at our next meeting in October!

### **Outdoor Programs**

**Cancellation Policy:** Inclement weather or other emergencies may cancel a field trip. Cancellation notices will be sent via the Club email and also posted on the CTBirds listserve when possible. Check the NHBC website *or contact the leader of the trip directly* if you have any questions about a possible cancellation.

Birders of all levels are welcome on all field trips, and every effort is made to help beginners. If you are new to birding or have any special needs, be sure to let the leader know. The Club welcomes everyone regardless of age, race or ethnicity, sex, gender identification, sexual orientation, or national origin. The ending times of walks are approximate.

The New Haven Bird Club does not charge any fees for its outdoor programs, but participants are responsible for the cost of their food, transportation, and entrance fees (where charged), unless the Club makes prior arrangements. Carpooling is usually encouraged to avoid parking problems at some destinations and to promote conservation of natural resources.

#### **NHBC Conservation and Education Activities**

The New Haven Bird Club routinely works to preserve and restore bird populations and their habitats and to provide opportunities for learning about birds, where to see them, and how to help ensure their future. Additional environmentally-focused, family-friendly walks may be planned and posted on the NHBC website.

The NHBC has been developing relationships with local public schools and camps to encourage children to embrace birding. We view this activity as directly connected to our Club objectives, and usually present a very basic birding skills class followed by a nearby bird walk. The Education Chair also organizes the Club's representation at various public events throughout the year.

This is a good time to look for fall and early winter migrants. There can be quite a mix seeing Baltimore Oriole, Pine Warbler, American Coot, Common Raven, Winter Wren, Fox Sparrow, and Red-shouldered Hawk. The Supply Ponds Preserve offers two generous ponds, a forest area, and a powerline cut. The forest has been damaged by severe storms in 2020, and tops of trees are gone. There is much dead wood on the ground, and the ground is receiving more sunlight. New plants are rising and bird dispersal is changing.

Broad Brook Reservoir annually hosts 200-400 Ruddy Ducks in fall, one of the highest concentrations of this diving duck in the state. Fresh Meadows offers a diversity of bird species through the year. Broad Brook Reservoir is level walking (100 yards) on leaf-covered paved road; Fresh Meadows Wildlife Sanctuary is level walking (500 yards) with water-resistant boots recommended.

### **Trip Reports**

# Geology and Birds: Stony Creek and Quarry Park Trip Report



On Saturday, September 14, 24 birders hiked into the Kelley Memorial Preserve in Branford to look at both rocks and birds. We heard about the geologic and quarrying history of the granite outcrops in the area, and the group was

able to see the active quarry from a trail adjacent to the rim. Birding was light but it was a good day for woodpeckers, as a few birders in the group were able to catch sight of a Redheaded Woodpecker, along with Northern Flicker, Downy, Hairy, Pileated and Redhellied. There were 28 species observed in total. On the second stop of the trip at the Quarry Park Preserve, the group learned about the local use of the New Haven Arkose sandstone for historical building and foundation stones. It was impressive to see the pits that were dug by hand

in the bedrock starting in the 1600s. Birding was quiet in this small urban preserve, with a total of 11 observed species.

# **Introduction to Lighthouse Point and Hawkwatching Report**

On September 15, seventeen enthusiastic and inquisitive birders attended this short course on the Lighthouse Point Park Hawk Watch. Topics covered included the history of birding and hawkwatching at Lighthouse Park, resources available to birders, and migration factors such as topography, time of day, seasons, weather, and climate. The availability of almost 50 continuous years of hawk watch data allows accurate trending of migrating raptor populations and these were also summarized. Abby Sesselberg's photos of Lighthouse Park raptors were used to highlight key field marks of each of the common hawk migrants. Many participants stayed well into the afternoon to help to find and count raptors. Of the many hawks seen, 82 were considered passage migrants and were reported to HawkCount. We had a total of 45 species of birds just at the watch site, including 2 heard-only Dickcissels. Several attendees noted that some of these birds were "lifers."

#### Farm River Bird Walk Report

Despite a poor migration showing so far this season we were able to record 33 species on Saturday, September 21. Highlights included: a Golden Eagle, Bald Eagle, Redshouldered Hawk, 3 flyover Red-throated Loons, juvenile Yellow-crowned Night Heron, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Belted Kingfisher, Eastern Phoebe, thrush species (only saw the breast but appearing to be a Hermit Thrush), and a Common Yellowthroat.

#### **Great Meadow Marsh Trip Report**

On Sept. 22nd, eleven birders joined trip leader Corrie Folsom-O'Keefe for a walk at the Great Meadow Marsh Unit of the Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge in Stratford, CT. The trip began with an overview of the restoration project at Great Meadows. In the 1950's, dredged material from Bridgeport Harbor was deposited on site, turning a healthy marsh ecosystem into an invasive plant filled upland area. The restoration project, which took place primarily from 2021-2022, involved the removal of most of the dredge and invasive plant material, regrading of the site, and planting more than 180,000 native grasses, perennials, and shrubs. Since 2022, the vegetation has really filled in, but there is still some work to do. Audubon and partners continue to manage invasive plants, make hydrological adjustments that allow water to naturally flow onto the site with the tides, and monitor restoration.

Twenty-two species were observed during the trip. Double-crested cormorants were observed swimming in Long Beach Blvd. pond while Savannah Sparrows foraged in the surrounding shrubs. A Northern Harrier, Great and Snowy Egrets, and Osprey could be seen flying along the edges of Lewis Gut. Along the railroad trail, participants observed Least Sandpiper feeding on mud flats and Song Sparrows scrounging for seed along the trail. As the morning warmed, Tree

Swalllows began feeding overhead. A shout-out to Mike Digioia for taking pictures. From Mike's photos we were able to determine that a high flying falcon was in fact a Peregrine!

numerous Wood Ducks and we got long, good looks in several places at groups in breeding plumage already. Awesome. A pair of Belted Kingfishers kept flying back and forth and perching in excellent photographic poses. A kestrel and a merlin made themselves available, and we kept seeing Great Blue Herons in flight and perched nearby, until on the dirt trail back to the parking lot, we found five perched together, high in the trees. All in all, we had 38 species, including a couple of warblers, a vireo or two, and a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. The morning started slow but finished in a rush.

I want to welcome all members and nonmembers to the 2024–2025 Winter Feeder Survey. We had good participation last year and I hope to see more members involved this year. In a nutshell, all that

you must do is to record the largest number of birds of a species that you see at one sighting at your bird feeders during one day of the week and report that number to me. You do not have to do it every day or at the same time of day, but at least one day during the week or weekend. Anytime you look out at your birdfeeders, just record the number of birds of a species that you see.

This year I am looking for a few more participants since I have been informed by a few of my long-time surveyors that they are moving and will not be able to participate.

There will be 2 Sessions this year due to the increasing presence of Black Bears and their taking down of feeders.

The First Session will start on Monday, November 4, 2024 and finish on Sunday, April 6, 2025. This is for those who have not had any reports of bears in their area and is 22 Weeks long.

The Second Session will start on Monday, December 9, 2024, and end on Sunday, March 9, 2025. This if for those who fear bears attacking their feeders. During this period the bears should be in hibernation and no threat to the feeders. It will be 13 weeks long.
